

In Memoriam

H. KINGMAN BURRILL

This summer, model railroading lost its premier O-Gauge builder. For over sixty years Kingman Burrill turned out prototypically faithful cars of every description, as well as motive power. It was the shortage of kits during World War II that inspired him to become a "scratch-builder" almost exclusively. His second great modeling interest was the circus and his 90 car fully-detailed circus train, "King's Cavalcade of Shows" was famous, not only in Massachusetts, but throughout the Northeast.

His portable 12' x 47 layout was always available for any occasion. During the 1984 NMRA Convention in Boston, he rented a hall up the street from his home so the layout bus tours could see and enjoy his models, as well as the Club layout. He never did build a home layout, but dedicated himself to the constant improvement of the club's equipment.

The "big guy", the "coach", died in West Bridgewater after several years of failing health. His comrades will miss him. (Thanks to Ed Lyons.)

DOUGLAS S. SMITH

The NMRA-NER has lost another stalwart Life Member, Past President Douglas S. Smith. Formerly of Bloomfield and Simsbury, Connecticut, he died 24 May 1999, st Brentwood Health Center in Lecanto, Florida at age 81. A noted modeler, photographer and author, Doug perfected and published articles on his system of "card-order" model railroad operation. His taped slide clinic on the subject has been presented at many NER Conventions and is still available at NMRA Headquarters.

He is probably best known for a full-color spread of his Brook Valley Railroad in the Saturday Evening Post. Among his more memorable achievements was the establishment of the guidelines for our national Achievement Program. Doug held MMR

Born in Philadelphia, Doug was a veteran of U.S. Naval aviation in World War II, and for most of his life was a salesman for the printing industry. He and his wife Anita moved to Jupiter, Florida twelve years ago. He is also survived by three daughters and their husbands, five grandsons and a great grandson. He was a member of the Citrus Railroad Club.







RICH LAUBE ON MODEL CONTESTS

"What I did on my summer vacation."

Bill Brandt and I went to the National Convention in St. Paul, and I attended a work session with other Regional and National Contest staff to be briefed on the latest in contest judging practices. This session concentrated on model contests but there will be others for photo and craft contests.

The goal of the work

session ws to achieve more consistent judging results, and to encourage everyone to conduct similar sessions in their own regions and divisions. Since we do judging only at conventions, I'll work with our judges at that time to provide any necessary clarification of principles. Nothing we discussed requires changes in how we judge, but we have been provided more direction on how to determine point scores based on a model's complexity.

Bill went one giant step further and spent an entire day actually judging models. I thank Bill for taking this time from his schedule. In the future, I will be receiving more information from the National Contest Chair and will pass it on to you so you can better understand judging requirements.

stand judging requirements.

National is trying to establish a registry of judges so it will be easier to find a judge when needed. These same judges would also be available for the Achievement Program (AP).

Winter is coming soon, so I expect everyone to get busy and build a model to bring to our Spring Convention in Lyndonville, Vermont. Even if you don't want to participate in the contest, consider bringing a model just for display. Everyone likes to look at models. That way, you can learn something that you can take back with you and apply to your own modeling.


Who's the Most Prolific NER Contest Award Winner?

My vote goes to Bob Bird. He has been winning awards since he first entered an NER contest in 1952 at Hartford, Connecticut, where his Erie Sway Back Box Car took first place. Since that time, Bob has won 26 First Place Awards, 16 Second Places, and 10 Third Place Awards. He has won the HUB Award eight times, the Delaware Trophy three times and the "Best in Show" Baldwin Trophy three times.

Most of his entries are maintenance-of-way and non-revenue cars, but sometimes he throws the judges a curve, like his "Hello Dolly" passenger car at Stratford last year. Ask him where he got the leather for the car seats.

The Uncoventional Convention

North Conway, New Hampshire October 15-17, 1999

The last issue (#197) of the Coupler went to press a few days before we received a complete information package on the Fall Convention from our hosts, the Hub Division. We couldn't wait any longer because of the September 1 pre-registration deadline imposed by the popularity of the Conway Scenic Railway's "Notch Train", a principal feature of the convention.

If you registered for the convention, but not the Red Jacket Hotel, they may accept reservations until October 1, but they are not very happy with our mini-registration form in the last issue. Remember: no walk-in convention registrations.

Driving Directions

From Boston: 130 miles, about 2.5 hours. Take Interstate 95 north to Portsmouth, NH. Pick up the Spaulding Turnpike (Rt 16) and travel north to Conway, and thence to North Conway. The Red Jacket Hotel is on the right.

From Portland, ME: 60 miles, about 1.25 hours. Take US 302 west to Route 16. Follow it north for about two miles to the Red Jacket in North Conway.

From the New York City Area: 315 miles, about six hours. Take Interstate 95 north (use I 495 beltline around Boston) and follow the directions given above for the trip from Boston. (Alternate: you can by-pass the Boston area by taking I 95 north to I 91 north, to I 84 east, to I 90 east (Mass Pike), to I 495 west and north of Boston).

From mid-New York State: take the Mass Pike (I 90) east to I 495, and follow the directions from New York City (above).

From upper New York State & Vermont: Drive to Burlington, VT and pick up I 89 south. Use exit 7 (Barre) and pick up Rt 62 to Rt 302. Follow Rt 302 east to Wells River VT/Woodsville, NH. Just beyond Woodsville, pick up NH Rt 112, the scenic Kancamagus Highway, to Conway. Turn left (north) on Rt 16 to North Conway.

Additional Program Details

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
