

# Director's Meeting, July 11, 2000

The meeting, held at the Great Falls Club in Lewiston, was called to order by the president at 7:12 p.m. Attending were directors Richard Breton, Ron Palmquist, Sanford Roberts, Dwight Smith, Alan Thurston, Pres. Larry Cannon and member Raymond Anderson.

The president read the minutes of the May 7, 2000 meeting, which upon the motion of Mr. Palmquist and seconded by Mr. Roberts, were accepted as read. he absence of the treasurer precluded a treasurer's report.

Pres. Cannon read and commented upon excerpts of the secretary's report on results from new membership efforts through June 26, 2000, at which time membership was 52, more than double a year earlier.

Director Roberts read the Nominating Committee report, recommending directors Cannon and Smith for re-election. Upon a motion and a second, the report was accepted.

The president reported in an informal meeting at the Lyndonville, Vt., Northeastern Region/NMRA convention regarding future regional conventions. The (Seacoast) Division has the opportunity to host the Spring 2002 convention in the

Portland/Lewiston area. The consensus opinion was that the Division should pursue the opportunity.

There was discussion of hotel and alternative convention facilities. Those in attendance supported considering alternatives with a Portland hotel site as a contingency at this stage of planning. Smaller group trips to area rail museums were discussed as alternatives to a larger fan trip. The possibility of opening the convention on Thursday for those wanting to take the group trips on Friday was mentioned.

Ron Palmquist volunteered to informally explore contacts in the Portland area, and Larry Cannon will do the same for the Lewiston area. Richard Breton will determine the support for layout tours in the Portsmouth area for those traveling from that direction. While additional communication may be required, it is hope a locale recommendation can be made at or before the next meeting.

The next meeting will be held Saturday, Oct. 21, 2000. Richard Breton and Sandy Roberts will attempt to find a location in the Rochester, N.H. area by mid-August. Ron Palmquist will pursue a Portland area backup site for the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 8:17 p.m.

# **North Conway Model Railroad Club**

The North Conway Model Railroad Club is located in the north end of Conway Scenic Railroad's former Boston & Maine freight house in North Conway, N.H. The club also has the use of a former Grand Trunk Ry. wooden caboose, owned by Conway Scenic RR. The club uses the caboose as a meeting room and lounge.

The club's recently expanded 500 sq. ft. operating HO layout features selectively compressed replicas of CSRR's North Conway station and yard, Frankenstein Trestle and Crawfords station in Crawford Notch. Other features include a logging railroad, a large paper mill complex, a granite quarry and, currently under construction, a seaport city with a large steamship tied up at a pier. Mainline operations are conducted over a full-length upper level loop and a shorter lower level loop.

The most unique feature of the club is that it is open for public viewing six-1/2 hours per day, three days per week from Memorial Day to mid-October. The current operating days are Tuesday-


Thursday and Saturday. Club volunteers man these operating sessions that attract thousands of visitors during Conway Scenic Railroad's busy operating season. Lengthy trains are run continuously during the operating sessions.

The club is not directly affiliated with the CSRR, but uses the railroad's facilities free of charge in exchange for opening the layout to the public. The layout visitors are primarily CSRR's passengers who drop in either before or after their full-scale train ride.

The North Conway Model Railroad Club has 80 dues paying members, and a core of about 18 to 20 active members who open the layout to the public, maintain the layout, the space it occupies and the club caboose. Three of the club's members are also members of the Seacoast Division of NER/NMRA. The club publishes the Notch Eight monthly newsletter and holds two business meetings per year. In between meetings, club business is conducted by an elected board of directors. Club dues are \$10.00 per year, which funds the newsletter and leaves a little left over for the electric and insurance bills. The majority of the funds for the layout itself are generated by a glass donation jar that sits on a

counter next to the guest register.

filtered through either our editor or secretary, I am open to suggestion. I do think over time you will establish your own filters and most likely find some people with whom you have common interests and start your own direct communications. This may sound absurd, but northern New England, Quebec and the Canadian Maritime Provinces have fewer active NMRA divisions that the greater Denver, Colo., area! Could we convince Caboose Hobbies to move to Manchester or Portland?

In any case, we have a need for mode immediate communications, particularly if we plan to expand our activities to include sponsoring a regional convention, have more frequent divisional meetings that represent and reflect all of our geography and increase the interaction of NMRA members in New Hampshire and Maine. There are also two largely inactive divisions to the north whose members might welcome inclusion in our events.

What are your views? I feel that as a division; 1) the most we have to offer is interaction; 2) we are a vehicle to communicate our views to the region; 3) we exist to promote model railroading (and the NMRA) to the population of two states; and, last, but certainly by no means least, 4) to have some fun in a hobby we all enjoy. With the right kind of divisional E-mail registry, I think we could improve in all these areas. Your thoughts please.
