Minutes of the Seacoast Division Meeting, Rochester, N.H., August 3, 2002


The Spate Award nominations were discussed; the only nomination received was the one from the Seacoast Division for the Amherst Society of Model Engineers.

Happy Birthday, RailPace

The magazine that covers news of interest to railfans in the northeastern U.S. this year celebrates its 20th anniversary. The official commemoration was a gala one-day event in late July hosted by editor/publisher Tom Nemeth for contributors, advertisers and readers at the Reading & Northern Railroad in Port Clinton, Pa. Some 200 of us toured the railroad's offices, shops and other facilities, and sat down to a catered lunch under tents on the railroad's well-manicured lawn. In the afternoon, there was a special Reading and Northern excursion train that ran from Port Clinton to Hometown Viaduct, a high steel bridge built over the Little Schuylkill River. The excursion included a run through the 926-foot long Tamaqua Tunnel, built in 1854, and a double photo runby for those who wanted to obtain video and photos of the special train. It was hauled by the newest Reading and Northern diesel power: a pair of ex-Union Pacific 3,500 horsepower SD50s painted in Reading Railroadstyle yellow and green with grey. Birthday cake and coffee capped the unforgetable experience.

What's New





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






