## Division Business <br> Minutes of the BOD Meeting Sept. 13, 2003

President Rich Breton opened the meeting at 1:00 p.m. at The Great Falls Model Railroad Club in Lewiston, Maine, with nine members present - six of whom were Board of Directors members. As there were not enough members for a quorum, the meeting was declared a BOD meeting. The minutes of the previous meeting were accepted without change. The treasurer read his report and it was accepted without change.

The chairman of the Achievement Program, Larry Cannon presented framed Achievement award certificates for Association Volunteer to Tom Coulombe and Ron Palmquist Larry noted that it takes many hours of work to acquire enough points to earn this award, and is not as easy as many think it is.

The Switch Tower editor, Ron Palmquist, presented his report. He told us the next issue will have a new column from Stan Jordan named "Armchair Superintendent," whose initial subject is rail painting. There will also be a calendar of events across the Division.
Bill Gaver presented handouts on the Wolfeboro Public Library project on the "Tradition of Model Railroading." This will be presented on November 1st, 6th, 15th and 23nd at the library at 259 South Main St. in Wolfeboro, NH. Art Fahie will donate the printing as well as money for other materials. The Great Falls Model Railroad Club will have a 4 -foot by 5 -foot layout at the library for the month.
The board voted to host the Northeastern Region/N.M.R.A. Spring convention in 2005 in Manchester N.H. The amount of time involved with the library projects and the convention will not allow us to run Rail Clinic 2004 or 2005. It is hoped that the convention will be able to be held on May 20-22, 2005.

## Seacoast People Win AP Certificates

Members Tom Coloumbe (at left in photo below) and Ron Palmquist, editor of The Switch Tower, have been awarded the Association Volunteer certificate from the National Model Railroad Association's Achievement Program (AP). Both are members of the Seacoast Division Board of Directors, and Tom

is Division treasurer.
Tom also is president of the Great Falls Model Railroad Club of Lewiston, his home town. Tom says: "I was reintroduced into the model railroad hobby when an injury in 1995 left me out of work for six months. My co-workers asked what I would like to do during my rehab period. I suggested my prior interest in the hobby that I had been doing off and on for the past 15 years. They signed me up for a subscription to Model Railroader and Railroad Model Craftsmen magazines. This rekindled my interest. During the winter, there appeared Model Railroader a request for merit badge counselors at the 1997 Boy Scout Jamboree at Fort A. P. Hill in Virginia. I felt that this was an opportunity for me to take advantage to help the Railroading Merit Badge program, especially since I was an adult leader here in Lewiston. What a fantastic time I had meeting new boys and adult leaders. When I returned to Lewiston, I talked about my experiences in Virginia to other scout leaders. One of them happened to belong to the Great Falls Model Railroad Club; he invited me to a club meeting and to talk to the members about my experience. At that meeting I showed a video clip of what I had photographed at the jamboree and from that meeting I joined the Club."

Ron has been a member of the Seacoast Division since accepting the invitation of the late Dr. Sidney Branson to join the Division and the Northeastern Region of NMRA in the mid-1970s. Earlier, he was a member of the Rocky Mountain Region while living in Denver, Colo. Ron, who was NMRA's public relations director for a year in 1979-80, is a
retired public relations professional and previously was a news reporter. His interest in trains, he says, must have been kindled while an infant traveling with his parents from Chicago to Gladstone, Mich., in a sleeping car on a Chicago \& North Western passenger train. "My father bought me an American Flyer train set for Christmas one year, however, he told me I was too young to play with it," he said. "I lost interest after a couple of years until I obtained a copy of a Boy's Life magazine that was loaded with model train articles. While in high school, I worked with a school chum on a model train setup and, as they say, the rest is history."

## Track painting: Color me functional

Not sure what color to paint the rails on your layout? There are probably 27 gazillion combinations of colors to choose from with many of them acceptable, depending upon where and when you look at real rails- light gray for brand-new rail right from the steel mills, freshly rusted rails which have been installed for a rather short time, dark gray for rails which are located near engine servicing facilities and therefore have oil/grease on them, darker brown rails which have been weathered for some time, etc. It's somewhat like "Beauty is in the eyes of the beholder."

Therefore, to avoid complete paralysis over the choice of a color, consider this mixture of Floquil paint: 10 parts of Railroad Tie Brown (\#F110014) to one part of Engine Black (\#110010).

When thoroughly mixed it will look like a dark gray, but when dry on the rails it takes on a dark brown color.
After it's dry, drag a small knife to scrape of any paint from the heads of the rails and from the gauge face of each rail, then run a 'Bright Boy' over the heads of the rails, and Voila!
