President's Message

Happy New Year! Seacoast Division Meetings: Are Changes Needed?



Help in finding the "Hot Spots"

What better way to develop a model railroad layout than to see what the 'big boys' are doing? There are numerous places to visit to see trains being run, various rail facilities and what locos and rolling stock are being used today.

Yes, but how do I know where to go to find busy rail locations so I don't waste time unknowingly waiting beside a line that has two trains a day—maybe. Well, I've been there, done that and have a better way to narrow my locations to places where I'm pretty sure to see quite a few trains while I'm there. Sure, *Trains* magazine has its 'Hot Spots' places and its "On Location" articles, but many of them are a long way away. Here's another suggestion: send a check for \$28.00 for a postpaid copy of the new *U.S. Railroad Traffic Atlas* by Harry Ladd to Ladd Publications, P.O.Box 1671, Orange, CA 92856-0671, tel.(714) 639-8639, or e-mail LadPub@earthlink.net.

You will receive a 100 page, spiral-bound booklet, 8 1/2"x 11", that contains scale maps of each state showing that state's rail lines plus some additional maps of rail systems such as Union Pacific, BNSF, Norfolk Southern, AMTRAK, Guilford Rail and CSX, as well as some 'blow-ups' of large cities (only rail lines are shown on any of these maps-no highways).

The key feature of these maps is that they show not just the various rail line locations but also show by the width of each line segment the volume of rail traffic on that segment. The new Railroad Traffic Atlas has been expanded to provide maps of heavy tonnage routes of Wyoming's Powder River Basin unit coal trains on BNSF and on UP. In addition, maps now show the locations of manned helper/pusher service where operated on each railroad. The maps include a legend to explain the line widths, railroad designations, location of engine facilities, average number of trains per day and mainline crew change points. So, you can now see in advance where the busy junctions are and where the higher volume rail lines are, thereby greatly increasing your chances of having a productive visit to a particular area.

Okay, now I know where 'the action' is supposed to be, but how do I get my car to Drawbar Junction or some other obscure rail site? Get a made-in-Maine DeLorme Atlas and Gazetteer for that State. DeLorme's maps show rail lines and they seem to show every back road to get you to that action spot.

Modelers at Work

Brad Thompson, Cape Elizabeth, Maine


Brad Thompson is an active modeler from Cape Elizabeth, Maine. You might remember his Helix layout article in an early 2003 issue of *The Coupler*, the publication of the Northeastern Region, NMRA.

Let's have him tell us about his newest project, the truck diorama.

"I took Schultz's Garage - a Design Preservation kit, and placed it on a piece of Masonite. I cut down the Masonite 1/16" around the foundation to allow the dirt to be built up flush with the door. I used real dirt, sifted very fine - it is almost dust. I sprayed it with a solution of water and dish washing soap, then dropped water mixed with white glue on it. The slat fence was made out of coffee stir sticks, and colored with a solution of water and India Ink, I used Chooch Automobile Junk Piles #7540. The whole area was sprayed to give it a well worn look. The truck has a Custom Finishing snowplow. I painted Floquil Rust all over the truck to make it look worn. Painting the body parts different colors gives it a real Maine look. Brad said it took only a couple of evenings to complete the diorama."

Brad also has modeled Portland's Union Station, and he has drawn the plans for the Grand Trunk station in Portland. "(I'm) waiting for time to build it."

Brad says he has 26 vehicles he is work-



ing on, including 12 in HO gauge and "a 1/25th scale car that was a '57 Ford hardtop and now is a '58 convertible." Then there

is a scratch built 1/25th scale Cape Elizabeth ladder truck-in April, he was working on the truck's ladders. "The list that I have has 36 structures, some kits, others are scratch built—the old Pond Cove Millwork farm house and barn (Cape Elizabeth), a house and barn on Fowler Road in Cape Elizabeth, the original Cape Elizabeth high school on Scott Dyer Road and Portland Head lighthouse," also in Cape Elizabeth.

Seacoast Division, Wolfeboro Library model railroad month program a big hit

The Seacoast Division of the Northeastern Region of the National Model Railroad Association recently completed a series of five November programs in recognition of National Model Railroad Month.

Conducted at the Wolfeboro Public Library in Wolfeboro, N.H., this outreach program of events attracted over 200 young and old alike with a diversified series of topics. In addition, according to Library Director, Cynthia Scott, over 1,100 visitors to the Library viewed a Lionel train exhibit by Sanford Roberts of Lebanon, Maine, a member of the Seacoast Division Board of Directors, and an HO operating model railroad layout constructed by the Great Falls Model Railroad Club of Lewiston, Maine.

Programs featured presentations by Richard Breton, President of the Seacoast Division, NER/NMRA, Dwight Smith, MMR, a long-time executive of the Boston and Maine Railroad and founder of the Conway Scenic Railroad in North Conway, N.H., and Michael Tylick of Sturbridge, Mass., a contributor to Model Railroad Magazine, a photographer and a model builder.

A special program for children ages 5 - 8. designed to introduce trains and train safety, featured Richard Parshley, a retired conductor of the Burlington Northern Railroad, plus a series of hands-on projects for "little engi-


