Amtrak had at least one Private Varnish open platform observation car added to its consist - the Morristown and Erie business car Ohio River, painted L&N purple. M&E business car Alexander Hamilton paid Portland a visit, too, with a maroon window band interrupting its shiny stainless steel sides. And, last but not least, the red, white, blue and black Thomas the Tank engine was enjoyed by hundreds of riders in late August

Here is an e-mail sent recently by New Hampshire member Roger Robar: "The B&M Railroad Station in Lisbon, N.H. will be restored. The town of Lisbon recently purchased the landmark station from it's owner who had plans to move it to Vermont. The station was built by the Boston, Concord & Montreal Railroad in 1853. The structure is known for its unusual architectural design with its steep curved roof and six dormers. Plans are not finalized as yet but hope to include a visitor's center, a meeting area and a small railroad museum. The town has received \$170,000 in grants with others pending." Roger, who is immediate past president of the North Conway Model Railroad Club, has been officially named Consultant for the project.

### GOODBYE, MR. MILLER

Newspapers throughout Maine and New England carried the obituary of Mr. E. Spencer Miller, former president of the Maine

Central Railroad, who died at his home in Scarborough Maine on Aug. 12. The Portland Press Herald reported that Mr. Miller was president, then



board chairman of the MEC for over 30 years - longer than any other Class I railroad chief executive officer. He was buried in Springfield, Vt., on Aug. 29.

With Walthers and Intermountain finally producing good models of milk cars, here are some references for you New England railroad barons:

"*New England States Limited*" magazine, Vol.1, No.1(summer 1977) and Vol.1, No.2 (fall 1977). Unfortunately, this good magazine is no longer produced; however, these two issues offer excellent photos of New England milk cars and descriptions of milk service plus rosters of milk cars of several roads.

"Railroad Model Craftsman" magazine, Feb. 1986 and March

1986. Good descriptions of tos of various railroad's milk cars, HO scale drawings of D&H and B&M milk cars, drawings of a wood milk car and a steel H.P.Hood & Sons milk car plus a listing of the number of milk cars owned



by railroads and by private owners in 1931 and 1962. (Our thanks to J.E., Lancaster for his prototype photo. - Ed.)

*"Railroad Model Craftsman"* magazine, Nov. 1991, has an article featuring some milk cars of the Cloverdale Dairy which served the New Orleans milkshed.

"Model Railroader" magazine, Jan. 1997 contains an article on "easy kitbashing techniques to create a variety of milk cars".

Walthers has recently offered a kit, #933-3799, of the "Sterling Consolidated Dairy" which could serve as a focal point of your railroad's milk traffic.





Intermountain has released this ready-to-run car with the following lettering: H.P. Hood & Sons, Sheffield Farms, Borden's, Whiting Milk Co., (four car numbers each), Mars, Inc., Baker's Chocolate and Consumer's Dairy (single cars). SMRP \$32.95 (Dealers report this car is very popular, and could be a sell-out. - Ed.) Below is the Walthers wooden milk car. # The Boston & Maine Claremont Branch: A Modeler's Favorite

nicely on this line. It may also be possible to acquire some Northeastern kits of the B&M open platform passenger coaches that were common on this route. Lineside Structures will most likely have to be scratch built or kit bashed from available products. It should be noted that a small piece of the Claremont is still in operation at Claremont. Now called the Claremont Concord Railroad, it serves a building materials dealer, a recycling firm and a salt distributor. The company has acquired several Alco switchers, but still uses the old 44-tonners. One may use the excellent Atlas S-2 or S-4 for power. There are even decals available to model the Alco S-4 in

> its present paint scheme. The branch would be a good subject for a shelf-type layout. But, whatever you choose, there are wonderful modeling opportunities and tremendous satisfaction to be achieved in your version of the Claremont Branch.

There are many popular choices for proto-

type rail lines for the modeler of American railroads. In Colorado, for instance, the Silverton branch or perhaps Rio Grande Southern might be chosen. In Vermont, the St. Johnsbury and Lamoille County, or maybe one of the Rutland branches, could be selected.

In New Hampshire, the fabled Claremont Branch of the Boston & Maine Railroad is close to the hearts of modelers and railfans alike. It's difficult to think of a N.H. branch line that has garnered more attention and publicity. The late author Edgar Mead did much to make us familiar with this line in his book, "*Through Covered Bridges to Concord*."

On the model railroading side, there are four articles that Scott Whitney wrote for Railroad Model Craftsman in 1993 and 1994. More recently, Trevor Marshall wrote a like number of articles on the C&C, complete with his HO gauge version of the branch.

At the Fishkill NER convention, I had a conversation with Terry Thompson, editor of Model Railroader magazine. He told me that a new G-scale layout article is being developed with the Claremont & Concord Railroad as the theme.

I can remember my first encounter with this fascinating B&M line. It was on a Sunday outing with my parents back around 1956. My father stopped in Melvin Mills to do a watercolor painting of the rustic depot. At the time, I did not even know what track this was or where it went. In later years, I remember seeing yellow-painted coaches around the Branford, N.H. area. I later learned that this was the headquarters of Nelson Blount's steam train operation. About 1971, the Mass Bay Railroad Enthusiasts chapter ran a fan trip on the remaining portion of the branch between Newport and Claremont Jct., and on the "electric route" to West Claremont.

This really piqued my interest. I resolved to model some of the equipment in the Pinsley era. I completed a GE 44-tonner, as well as a woodchip car and some tank cars.

For those who wish to model in the B&M era, there may be some brass models of the B-15 moguls, or the A-41 eight-wheelers, available. The Walthers EMC gas-electric car will work out quite
