NORTH CONWAY MODEL RAILROAD CLUB

WHO ARE WE?

The North Conway Model Railroad Club is located in the north end of Conway Scenic Railroad's former Boston & Maine freight house in North Conway, NH.

The club's 500 sq. ft. operating HO layout features selectively compressed replicas of CSRR's North Conway station and yard, Frankenstein trestle and Crawford's station in Crawford Notch. Other features include a logging railroad, a large paper mill complex, a granite quarry, and a seaport city with a large steamship tied up at a pier. Mainline operations are conducted over a full length upper level loop and a shorter lower level loop. Additional trains are operated over a logging branch, a trolley line and a special section of track devoted to Thomas the Tank Engine.

The most unique feature of the club is that it is open for public viewing at no charge, although donations are accepted. The layout is open every Tuesday-Thursday-Saturday from 10 to 4 from late June until mid-October. Club volunteers man these operating sessions which attract thousands of visitors during Conway Scenic Railroad's busy operating season. As many as seven trains are run continuously during the operating sessions.

The club is not directly affiliated with Conway Scenic Railroad, but occupies the railroad's facilities free of charge in exchange for opening the layout to


the public. The layout visitors are primarily Conway Scenic Railroad's passengers that drop in either before or after their full scale train ride.

The club has about 100 dues paying members, and a core of about 18 to 20 active members that open the layout to the public, maintain the layout, and the space it occupies. The club publishes the "Notch Eight" monthly newsletter and holds two business meetings per year. In between meetings club business is conducted by an elected board of directors. Club dues are ten dollars per year, which funds the newsletter and leaves a little left over for the electric and insurance bills. The majority of the funds for the layout itself are generated in the club layout room by a glass donation jar that sits on a counter next to the guest register book.

President Robinson called the meeting to order at 10:00AM. Jill Bollinger of Best Trains attended the meeting and reviewed their manufacturing company. She talked about how they develop some of their kits. Jill also discussed how they try to involve young people in the hobby. She provided copies of the current catalog and noted that people

should visit their website, www.besttrains.com . She brought a sample model to show how easy it is to apply their shingles, and every member received a model garage kit. The group thanked Jill for her informative presentation.

Bruce then invited members to share in a "show and tell" session.

Rich Breton reviewed detailing small scenes with fences, some commercial and some manufactured.

Sandy Roberts reviewed an O scale (Lionel) engine that he has rebuilt to replace the battery.

Larry Cannon showed his "evolution" of a paint scheme for a free lance railroad including motive power and rolling stock.

Paul Lessard showed two backdrop buildings that he has modeled (including a miniature rat!)

Neal Falby reviewed his latest project, a laser kit that he has completed. He also showed a tool he developed for applying glue using a pipette and a "touch and flow."

Bruce thanked the presenters for their participation in the meeting. Bruce then awarded a book on styrene modeling and a railroad puzzle as door prizes.

President Robinson then turned to the business portion of the meeting, starting with committee reports.

Treasurer's Report: Terry King reported and ending balance of \$2,390.95.

Newsletter: Terry King has taken on this responsibility for which Bruce thanked him on behalf of the group. Terry also reviewed the number of newsletters that have sent out. Jun1st is the deadline for submitting material for the next newsletter.

The discussion then turned to the potential for using e-mail to communicate with the membership as well as the further development of the website. The group agreed that the division would attempt to use e-mail as one of its principal means of communication. January 10 was set as the target date for rolling out the updated website.
