#### THE GREAT FALLS MODEL RAILROAD CLUB

The Great Falls Model Railroad Club holds regular meetings on the third Thursday of each month at 144 Mill Street in Auburn, Maine. Renovations to the building and construction of permanent layouts in various gauges continue every Saturday morning and Wednesday evening.

The Great Falls Model Railroad Club was started in 1987 by a group of model railroaders who saw each other frequently at *The Freight Station*, a hobby shop in Auburn. About fifteen people came to an introductory meeting at Edward Little High School in Auburn and soon formed a club with monthly meetings there.

For more than ten years before The Great Falls Model Railroad Club was formed, Al Thurston and Wally Chase had sponsored a train show each fall at different locations in Auburn for the Seacoast Division of the Northeast Region of the National Model Railroad Association. Since 1987, the club has sponsored the annual model train show, now held each year on the first Saturday of November at the Auburn Middle School.

The club developed uniform standards for portable model railroad sections so that all members could add their own sections to the modular displays which have been taken to train shows throughout the state.

Because the club has been recognized as a 501(c)3 Educational Foundation since 1993, donations to the club are tax deductible. As part of our mission as an educational foundation, club members have helped

Boy Scouts earn railroading badges and have displayed layouts at veterans' homes, nursing homes, libraries, DARE programs, and railroad safety programs sponsored by Operation Lifesaver.

Twice a year, during fall and spring semesters, the club offers an eight week Model Railroading Course at Edward Little High School as part of the Auburn Adult Education program. By actually building modules, the class gets practice in using the tools and techniques for model railroading, including wiring, creating scenery, and following modular standards.

The club's newsletter *The Signal* has grown into an outstanding color publication which reports the club's activities and upcoming events. It is also available to the general public on our website.

# MINUTES

April 20, 2010

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The quarterly meeting of the Seacoast Division of the NMRA was held at the Rochester Community Center in Rochester New Hampshire from 10Am -2PM on Saturday 17 April 2010. Thirty Division members were in attendance. The program began with a series of presentations and clinics followed by lunch and the business meeting. To start off the day, Vice President Paul Lessard talked about the Rutland Railroad and had an HO train on display depicting some of the Rutland's typical car types. Secretary Tom Jones followed with a show and tell about the portable modeling table he uses at train shows and when traveling. Scott Jewell who was the main speaker for the morning followed with a fabulous slide show and discussion about the Boston waterfront and his interpretation of it in his home layout the "Docs and Rocks". Scott has done extensive research on the railroads of Boston and was very informative about how goods were shipped in an out at the various port facilities. The attendees asked lots of questions throughout the hour-long presentation. Scott's wonderful clinic was followed by Mike Grahame's show and tell about how he puts together backdrop buildings with DPM and Walthers kits. He showed a handy leveling board he uses to keep everything straight. Neil Falby had a display and passed around a decaled truck from Falby's Printing Company.

Neil also wanted to specifically thank Dana Everett, Rich Breton and Dick Anderson for their help in getting going with his modeling. Larry Cannon showed a quick gig for cutting rail to the 39' standard length and their were a couple books passed around one on Hon3 and the other showing the car ferry and facilities at Wiscasset Maine across from Bath. The presentations made everyone hungry and mini sub sandwiches; the attendees quickly devoured chips, cookies and soda.

The business meeting was opened at 1:03PM. The treasurer's report was presented by President Bruce Robinson in the absence of Treasurer Tom Coulombe and approved by the members. Terry King, the Newsletter publisher was not present to take some good-humored ribbing on the upside down printing in the last newsletter. President Robinson wanted to thank Terry for the hard work he puts in to the Switch Tower each month. The secretary's report was approved as published in the last newsletter. Rob Carigan made a plea for ideas on content for the Seacoast Division's website which can be found by going to the NMRA site and linking through the North East Region's site. Committee reports were followed by old business. President Robinson shared his email response to the Region concerning hosting an upcoming convention. It was felt we didn't have the manpower to host a convention in 2011 but will solicit the division for hosting one in 2012. President Robinson then went over upcoming shows and conventions. It was noted that several members of the Seacoast Division will be presenting clinics at the Maritime Divisions "Tracks & Tides" convention in St John, NB. The convention is being held May 20-23. Information can be found linked through the NMRA's website or a Google search on "Tracks and Tides". A flyer was also passed around on the National convention, which is in Milwaukee this July. It is the 75th Anniversary of the NMRA and is expected to be an exceptional convention and National Train Show.

Under new business, the March "Introduction to Model Railroading" course -March 2-April 20 was cancelled due to lack of students. A small increase in the courses cost and the poor economy were sited as probable reasons for poor signup. Next, Erich Whitney talked about how he and his daughter Brenna are participating in a youth in model railroading group where the kids build modules and participate in running trains at several of the train events in the Northeast. Erich was soliciting interest in developing a similar program in the Seacoast division. Several members with children thought this might be a good way to get young people involved. # **Rutland Railway**

A Modeler's Favorite

New England was blessed with a number of interesting railroads that we can use as prototypes. Near the top of the list is the Rutland Railway which operated in the states of Vermont and New York. I first got acquainted with this railroad through Jim Shaunessy's excellent book entitled, "The Rutland Road". This line had a unique charm in that its operations included milk trains and mixed freights traveling through the quaint rural areas of Vermont and New York. However, it was also known for wheeling long freight trains at speed in

the busy Burlington to Bellows Falls gateway. Up until 1953, its passenger business had trains with names like, "Green Mountain Flyer" and "Mount Royal". It is easy to see why model railroaders find this railroad so appealing. The steam locomotives included some of the oldest teakettles, as (Continued on page 3)

well as some of the most modern in New England. The diesel fleet was a hallmark of simplicity. Except for a lone GE 70-tonner, the roster was entirely filled with Alco RS-1s and RS-3s. The passenger cars were generally quite old with some wooden cars still active in the later years. During the 1950s, the company focused on the freight service and modernized its fleet with new boxcars, covered hoppers and gondolas bought from the Pullman-Standard Co.

In our model railroad world, however, the Rutland is still vigorous and thriving. There are well known hobbyists such as Brian Whiton, and Andy Clermont with Rutland – themed pikes. Let's not forget Lou Sassi who included Rutland trains in his Hoosic Division. The late Bob Nimke wrote a comprehensive nine-volume history of this railroad and its operations and I am fortunate to have this history in my collection.

Finally, I would like to dedicate this article to our late Seacoast Division secretary, Joel Ditrilio, who was a Rutland fan and modeler.

The club's first "permanent" location for modules and meetings was at a vacant bookstore in Lewiston's Promenade Mall, where the general public could watch club members operating trains and working on modules. Modules were dismantled and taken to shows and put together again between shows.

The next big move was a rented space in the basement of a downtown business location on Canal Street Alley in Lewiston near the Bates Mill complex. Here a permanent layout was built without the use of modules. New and original members created an outstanding layout and learned to use DCC.

In 1997 Auburn's local cable access station, Great Falls TV, offered a class teaching how to develop programs for their station. They were also looking for volunteers to help with their internal video needs. As a result, club members who enjoyed videotaping trains started a show called *TRAIN TIME*. The group has produced more than two hundred 30-mintue shows which are now seen throughout Maine on Time Warner Cable Channel

9, more than 25 additional local cable access stations in Maine, and several channels in New Hampshire. As well as videotaping trains in Maine for the program, some *TRAIN TIME* team members have traveled to New York, Pennsylvania, and California. The shows also include a number of model railroad clinics and model railroads in different gauges.

In 2007 the club purchased a 6,000 square foot building in Auburn. After more than a year of renovations, we are now putting up benchwork and laying track for the club's HO operating layout. Another section of the club house will feature G-gauge and N-scale layouts. Other parts of the building are used for meeting space, surplus inventory sales, and an extensive library. The library is continuously growing and currently has over 10,000 picture slides, 600 books, and more than 6,000 magazines, many of which are complete sets dating from the 1950's or earlier to the present.

In November of 2009, the club sponsored its first Christmas theme "ExTRAINaganza," with different gauges of trains under decorated Christmas trees and special activities for children. Visitors enjoyed watching several operating modular
