- Interchange tracks
- Coach yard for head end and passenger cars
- Icing facilities



MEC Cherryfield, Maine Station - Bob Bennett

Bob Bennett has had a number of articles published in Railroad Model Craftsman (RMC) and wrote a review of the MEC Cherryfield, ME Station laser cut wood craftsman kit manufactured by Banta Modelworks for the magazine and it was published in the Nov 2007 edition. The kit was created by Banta for the EMMRC as a club fundraiser and a few kits are still available for purchase from them. The Cherryfield, ME Station is located on the Calais Branch of the MEC and was constructed circa 1898 by MEC predecessor Washington County Railroad. The railroad and the station became part of the MEC in 1911. MEC discontinued passenger operations through Cherryfield in 1957 but the station remained open until 1975 serving freight customers in the area. In 1985, the Calais branch was abandoned but the station was purchased by the Cherryfield – Narraguagus Historical Society and moved half a mile to a location on Main St. near the Narraguagus River with


the intent of creating a museum. While the museum is yet to be fully realized, the building is still apparently intact. Bob made some very complimentary statements about the Banta product, and provided a comprehensive review of the kit and instructions, his construction tech-


niques, and painting and finishing suggestions.

your next project. Gatorfoam is an extruded polystyrene foam bonded between two layers of wood fiber veneer. Gatorfoam is a very stable and durable material which comes in various thicknesses and colors. John showed a coal mine diorama built upon a Ga-

torfoam base as well as a switch panel he had fabricated using the material. <u>John also noted that he had recently added an 8'</u> by 21" extension to his model railroad making extensive use of

Bob Bennett discussed how to achieve an accurate looking narrow gauge combine. Recent releases by <u>Bachmann</u> provide nice looking cars but they scale out just a little bit wide. Bob brought examples of similar combines and discussed the pros and cons of

Custom Brass

- beautiful car but expensive and probably not a layout car (car that you would use every day on the

Re-worked Bachmann car – requires cutting up and piecing back together the finished Bachmann ready to run car Portland Locomotive Works, or San Juan Car Shops – nice

craftsman kits that take some work

Scratch building – intimidating and a lot of work but may be the only way to get a specific car. Not that much more work than a craftsman kit if you have the plans.

2014 NER Convention Report by Erich Whitney

The 2014 NER, New England Diamonds, convention was co-hosted by The <u>HUB</u> Division and the <u>Nutmeg Division</u> of the NER and held in Palmer, Massachusetts. I attended all four days of this convention and wanted to share my thoughts and experiences with you. First and foremost, I would like to thank the HUB and Nutmeg divisions for putting on a very good convention. The owners of the Steaming Tender Restaurant pulled out all the stops for us and provided great food and the right atmosphere for us to enjoy our time in Palmer.

This convention was quite unconventional in several ways and I know that many people had concerns about whether or not these changes would cause problems. Probably the biggest factor for me was staying in the convention hotel about 20 minutes west on the Mass Pike. Most of the clinics were held at the middle school in Palmer on Saturday with the Friday afternoon/evening clinics at the high school. Having the convention venue spread out meant a little bit more than usual planning but I didn't find that too onerous. I will summarize my participation in the convention followed by some thoughts on the future of conventions.

My convention weekend started with a stop at the Worcester Model Railroad Club for an operating session. I arrived a bit after the session started because of a scheduling conflict with work, but Joe Parker and his crew were very welcoming and accommodating hosts. I chose to operate a couple of mainline freight turns and I found it particularly cool that I had to switch in Palmer along the way. This was a fun coincidence and I think it pretty much set the tone for the weekend. After my last run, it was time to hit the road and head to the real-life Palmer to check-in and prepare for my evening activities. Registration was located in the passenger car outside of the Steaming Tender—that was pretty cool. Registration complete, Bruce Robinson and I headed to Chicopee to check-in at the hotel, grab some quick dinner, and head off to the evening operating session at Bill Duffe's "LKJ&W- B&M and Rutland Divisions". If you

haven't seen this layout either in magazines or in person you are missing something. James VanBokkelen and I spent the evening running passenger and freight service



from one end of the layout to the other. The buildings and scenery are just gorgeous and the railroad ran beautifully.

Friday for me was "Prototype Tour" day and this started out with a visit to the Pioneer Valley Railroad in Westfield, Mass. When we arrived on the property we were greeted by the crew and shown around the place. But to my surprise, we were also treated to a tour of their railroad in a 1950's passenger car pulled by one of



their locomotives that they had just painted in time for our visit. That was a pretty special time! It's great to see a short line railroad like this doing so well. Their business is growing as they continue to fill an important niche for their customers. We left Pioneer Valley and headed back to Palmer for lunch at the Steaming Tender then we were off to the Mass Central Trans-load Facility. This was a selfguided tour—the railroad left their facility open to us to wander around. This was fortunate because I needed a fair amount of time to head to our evening operating session. Tom Oxnard and I made the trek west on the Mass Pike out to exit 2 then north to Adams. On the way, we were discussing a strategy to find a Subway and wouldn't you know it we rounded the corner into Pittsfield and there was one right there! Our destination Friday evening was Dick Elwell's "Hoosac Valley Railroad". I probably can't tell you anything about the HVRR and Dick Elwell that you don't already know but I will tell you that this railroad has a special place in my heart. It was seven years ago that Dick opened his layout to the Youth in Model Railroading kids and my daughter was among the crowd. As she entered his basement, he handed her a throttle and off she went—it was her first time running DCC and she hasn't looked back. As I entered his basement Friday night, I was as giddy as a school boy, anxious with anticipation to finally operate this layout myself. Scooter and I decided to take the Berkshire Junction Yard and we had a blast moving iron all night. This railroad is a lot of fun and of course the scenery is exceptional. Tom and I decided to take the scenic route back to Chicopee from Adams in hopes of seeing some Northern Lights but alas the trip was only illuminated by the beady little lights of my Prius into the wee hours.

Saturday began with a trip across the street to Denny's for breakfast. The complimentary continental breakfast at the hotel got old fast. My mom always told me if you don't have anything nice to say, don't say anything. Enough said about the hotel. We spent the entire day Saturday in Palmer. The middle school was set

up with clinic rooms, a small train show, and several modular operating layouts. I hope you can appreciate that after Laconia, I was chomping at the bit to actually run a train at a convention! Please understand that I was glad to volunteer to chair the 2013 convention for our division, but I will always regret that I was unable to be one of the lucky 200+ who got to go. This year was different for me and I set out to take advantage of the fact that I was not on the hook for anything to do with running this convention. So I signed up for the first operating session time slot on the Amherst Belt Lines Modular Layout. I jumped at the chance to run a way freight and I spent my entire turn hard at work. I managed to complete the switching tasks just in time to make it to my first clinic, "Introduction to Craftsman Kits 101" by Robert Seckler & Jimmy Diegnan. This was a fantastic "make and take" clinic and I had a lot of fun building the little wooden feed store. By the time that clinic ended it was after lunch and this is where my planning hadn't really been completely thought out. I was going to go back and operate another train but decided to take a short walk to downtown Palmer where I found, you guessed it, another Subway! Re-energized from lunch and a fun chat about all things railroad with one of the attendees who had the same idea, I headed back into the school where I spent some time in the contest room reviewing this year's entries. Besides, I had to check out the competition in the photo category. My wife, Holly, entered the photo contest for the first time. I only had a few minutes to scrutinize the models before I headed off to my next clinic, "Water Effects" by Jeff Gerow. Again, I had a blast with this "make and take" playing with creating water flow from a completely flat river made from Magic Water. Jeff did a fantastic job of describing how water moves and how to capture that motion in a static model. My try at this is still drying before the moment of truth when I add the dry-brushed white paint. Come to our quarterly meeting on

October 18th if you want to see it—I'll have it available for Show & Tell.

Saturday evening was the somewhat traditional convention banquet at the Steaming Tender. I really like this part of the convention—it's a time to meet and

talk to people who love the hobby and love telling stories even more. The evening program did not include the traditional awards segment. We had a wonderful presentation of rail fanning by ESU's Matt Herman. In his job, he is often on the road to capture photographs and record the sounds of various locomotives to supply the model decoder business he's in. But more than that, Matt is a rail fan and he takes great photos and tells fun stories.

Sunday's Annual Meeting of the NER was quick and to the point. Of note, the Seacoast Division NMRA received over \$800 this year from the NER as part of the division disbursements. From now on, every year that the NMRA



How I Kitbashed a Brewery by Tom Oxnard



its 14 building complex, some early vertical structures and



later horizontal expansion, and how it now houses the Sam Adams Brewery.

There was also a site on the internet with a hundred "Images", one of the old buildings, of logos, and some current pictures of the building and smokestack. I also googled "Images" of other old breweries around the country

I have a classification yard at the south end of my freelanced Boston and Maine Railroad in the city of Bristol (aka Boston). Around it I have put several large buildings, businesses, and industries. As I get down to the last remaining open unused real estate in this urban area, I have been looking through my books about the B&M to see what kinds of industries I could build in a 30 inch by 12 inch space between my track and the wall.

I made the Fountain Brewery by SS Ltd more than 15 years ago, and had removed it from my layout several years ago during a




Fountain Brewery by SS Ltd

past expansion and remodel. I still enjoy the detailed brickwork and overall structure so much that I kept it sitting in this same real estate space just as a "filler" until I decided what I wanted to finally place there. Over the years I thought

about how I would change this nice building to make it a little different, and whether it would stay as a brewery or not.

I then got on the internet to see if there were some old breweries in Boston (google Boston's old breweries). I found a list of 25 old breweries. Most however were in existence from the 1850's to the early 1900's and may have folded during Prohibition. The Haffenreffer Brewery was one in existence from 1870 to 1964 and qualified to be a candidate on my 1950's railroad. I then googled the Haffenreffer Brewery and found information about

Having determined that I was going to make an expanded brewery, I made paper copies of the walls of the Fountain Brewery kit, and tried putting them together in different ways, until I was happy with the look of the building in the space that I had. I decided not to have it connect by rail and there is no spur track there. Because it was a background building and viewed only from one side, I proceeded to carefully remove the back of the building to be reused later. I replaced that back part with styrene brick sheet even though it would never be seen. The rest of the building stayed as original, except for the left end of the loading dock that had to be altered for the new addition.

The back three vertical walls were made into an addition on the

brick sheet walls and flat roof. I had to remove the back half of the loading dock and roof at this end in front of this loading door. I airbrushed these sections Polyscale Box Car Red and painted the roofs Grimy Black.

On the roofs I added two scratchbuilt water tanks, several chimneys and smokestacks and the custom bill-board sign from Blair Line. The smokestack in back is from Walthers, sprayed Polyscale Earth, and lettered vertically. I decaled the building sign with Woodland Scenics dry transfer



letters on a background of Grimy Black as seen on the one old picture that I had.

The red Haffenreffer signs on the building and trucks came from the same "Image" site. I scaled these to size and printed them on regular computer paper and applied them with a minimal amount of yellow carpenters glue after finding that white glue and water made the ink run. The trucks were bought from Classic Metal Works and repainted to match the logos.

The scene is completed with appropriate grain bags, containers, pallets, barrels, and guardrails. The building already had the gutters and downspout. The background pictures are printed from Bill Brown's Railroad Graphics Volume 5 (LARCProducts) and add even more reality.




right end of the factory. I cut off the bottom of the two peaked sections with a saw and reduced the bottom windows to basement windows. I cut off the top part of the mid section to match the height of the addition. I made a new roof from .040" styrene and added 2" x 2" styrene strips vertically to match the original metal roof. It is painted with a blend of Polyscale Dark Green and Aged White. I reattached the third cupola in the center after notching it for the peak.

The area between this section and the original building was made into a flat roofed extension so I could add typical roof details seen in many of the breweries. It is made from styrene brick sheet with details added from DPM and horizontal layers of brick sheet built up for ornamental detail. Windows are from Northeast Scale Lumber. The interior has a black paper view block. The addition at the left end is similarly constructed with

It has been fun giving this wonderful old model a new life and to use some local history to do it. Next I will have to find some old Haffenreffer beer memorabilia on eBay to display.

Since 2010, MGRS has set up a large layout (four tiers and over 1,000 square feet) at the Maine Mall during the Holiday Season. The club raises funds for charities, including for Maine tourist railroads. See its website for its many activities and calendar of events. Today, it is organized as a non-profit corporation with (501(c)(3) designation by the IRS and is governed by bylaws and a board of directors.

(NH) Concord Model Railroad Club

In July, the NER paid one-half of the profits of the Tracks to Lakeport 2013, the NER convention that Seacoast Division NMRA hosted last October in Laconia, NH. This happy event was followed by an unprecedentedly large distribution from the NER which was received at New England Diamonds 2014 on September 14. The NER Board of Directors met in early September and restated and refined its financial support policy for its 11 active divisions. As a result, the Division received its share of

- 1) the NMRA Rebate Remittances received in March and September 2014 and
- 2) half of the appreciation of certain assets owned by the NER

On a smaller scale, the Division received:

- five subscription renewals,
- a private donation, and
- deposited in its operating account excess funds from Derry Model Railroad Fun Night.

Expenditures for the third quarter were minimal, so the Division's financial strength has more than doubled since the last quarter. The Board of Directors will hold a special planning meeting in November to consider how best to take advantage of this financial strength for the benefit of its members.

A message from Allen Pollock, Interim At Large North American Director -

I have just returned from the Board of Directors meeting held in Cleveland on July 11th and 12th. There were many topics discussed and acted upon, most of which will be covered in other venues, such as President Getz's column, board meeting reports on the web page and in the magazine. But one topic that deserves attention here, and in the other media mentioned above is the declining membership.

Programs and activities are in the works to address this problem. However, I believe that it is not solely the job of the membership promotional volunteers at the national level, as well as the regional and divisional folks. The most immediate attack on the membership decline lies with you and with me. We all know fellow model railroaders locally who for whatever reason don't belong to the NMRA. In many cases there is a confrontation or situation of long ago that happened to cause the member to not renew the membership, or deter this potential member from joining. Ironically, it was not a confrontation with the NMRA itself, but rather a situation involving another volunteer representing the NMRA which turned negative. I think we would do a great service to the Association to talk with these folks, try to determine their resistance to renew or join, and explain that most likely the original offending parties are no longer involved or the situations have now been corrected.

Another avenue to offer these folks is to simply enroll them as a member. That can be as inexpensive as the \$9.95 Rail Pass membership, or as elaborate at a full one year membership with the NMRA Magazine. There are some divisions already enrolling and paying for the Rail Pass for visitors to their meetings. Internal studies have proven that the retention rate for renewal of these memberships is surprisingly high. This is a great gift to offer to a potential member, and should get their attention that you are serious about the NMRA, and want to share that with them. If each of us reading this InfoNet News would commit to signing up one new member, regardless of who actually paid the membership rate, this situation would be turned around in very short order.

The demographic data available has told us that almost all membership organizations have a problem with memberships declining. This is related to the fact that young people prefer not to join groups, spend more time than previous generations on electronic media, and are seeking instant gratification. While we may be able to convince these folks to join our NMRA at some point in the future with programs underway and directed at them, I think we should immediately address the potential members who form the group of age 45 on thru retirement. We meet these folks at divisional activities, conventions and train shows all the time.

I have signed up my new members, will you commit to sign up yours?



Lawrence "Dale" Edwards Sr. Co-founder of Kadee®

February 1921 –September 2014

A True Pioneer in Model Railroading, Dale Edwards was the "D" in Kadee and his identical twin Keith was the "K".



The twins started Kadee in the mid 40's and created the first knuckle couple that actually looked and worked like the real ones. With several improvements on the original design, the Magne-matic® metal knuckle coupler became an instant hit. Today, the knuckle coupler is the de-facto standard in Model Railroading. In, 1961 they designed and built

the twin rail spiker that allowed modelers to lay their own track by driving miniature spikes over the toe of the rail holding it in place. In the 70's they began to produce a line of freight cars that were noted for their detail and accuracy in N scale. These Micro-Trains® were the finest detailed ready to run rolling stock built. In 1990 the twins decided to split the company with Dale taking Kadee with the HO couplers and larger and Keith with the Micro-Trains line N Scale and smaller. With the impending expiration of the coupler patent, Dale knew he had to create something innovative and "special" that would leapfrog the competition and began developing a brand new model of the PS1 40' boxcar. The work to create all the tooling for the molds and die making would take accuracy, detail and meticulous craftsmanship in order to have operational moving doors, see through roof walks and scale grab irons and ladders. This was once again, done ALL in house. Dale was also responsible for the creation of the "Whisker" coupler centering system he designed in the mid 80's. However, application of the Whisker stalled until 2006 when a suitable wire was created.

Dale had his hand in developing more than 40 patents and Kadee now manufactures couplers, components, HO RTR rolling stock and accessories made of metal and plastic in HO scale through G scale all made entirely in White City, Oregon.

Dale believed in the American dream, his employees and vision to make the best possible products with the quality people he employed while doing so all under one roof as to not sacrifice quality nor lose control of supply chains.

Dale was preceded in death by his older sisters Wilda and Nathie, older brother Al, his wife Grace and twin brother Keith. His five children Larry, Jacque, Bonnie, Melinda and Doug and

his many grandchildren will miss him greatly.

Dale's legacy and business Kadee will continue manufacturing

America's finest model railroading products for years to come. Because that's the way he wanted it!!!

May God Bless Dale as he fulfilled his love of trains which was his passion, his life and legacy.


Larry had the enviable childhood of growing up in Mooers, NY and hanging around the depot with all the railroad men and their stories.
